We've had a wet season this summer! I was looking at my vernal pond yesterday, amazed that it is filled to the brim right now. Last year at this time, it was completely drained by a summer drought. Maybe that's why all the little frogs and peepers still keep making such music at dusk!

I wish I was a better poet, one who could create thought-provoking and vivid images with the words they write. Nevertheless, this ever-so-brief poem I came across recently made quite an impression on me. It is called, "Forecast" and was written by Luci Shaw:

Planting seeds

Inevitably

Changes my feelings

About rain

There are numerous helpful insights here in these eight words. First, a new perspective on adversity. Commonly, rain

is seen as a nuisance. Of course, it's necessary for life, but rare is the parent who is thankful the ballgame was rained out. Not many among us would choose to picnic, ride a bike, drive a convertible, or play golf in the rain. Instead, we tend to avoid doing much of anything when it rains.

On the other hand, disappointment and adversity can build character. We are all going to go through difficult stages in life. When we do, we might try to look for the good. "For the

moment all discipline seems painful rather than pleasant, but later it yields the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who have been trained by it" (Heb. 12:11).

Second, this short poem offers a new perspective on labor.

Hard work usually pays off. The investment of time and energy may not be immediately rewarded, but it'll come. So, take the time to plant seeds. Plant seeds of kindness. Plant seeds of love. Jesus often used the imagery of planting seeds in his ministry, from the way people would receive the Good News (Matt. 13:1-23) to the way the Kin-dom would grow (Matt. 13:31-32).

Third, we might receive a new perspective on hope.

Sometimes it is difficult to see past the storm clouds. In those moments, we would do well to remember that without the rain, there is no growth. Let us be patient in all things and trust that God will bless us with blue skies after our storms. "He who goes out weeping, bearing the see for sowing, shall come home with shouts of joy, bringing his sheaves with him" (Ps. 126:6).

Plant seeds. Expect rain. Enjoy God's blessings. Happy fall!







#### Elisha's Corner

# By Gary Thompson, Church Historian **Singing Songs of Praise**

"Outward Melody in Religious Singing is no small Help to inward Devotion. In this our [embodied] State the Senses do very strongly impress the superior Power of the Mind; especially the Ear and Eye do variously affect the Heart."

Rev. Cotton Mather penned these words in April of 1721. He was a strong advocate of singing as an integral part of a worship service, following on what John Calvin insisted was an effective and completely valid way to praise God, but only when inspired by God. In the mid-seventeenth century the Puritans in England had dismantled and removed the church organs, believing that the unaccompanied congregational singing was the only acceptable form of church singing. Yet singing was also considered a deterrent to the concentration on God and religious living. The form of verse was thereby thought to be only through the signing of the Psalms. The colonial Congregationalists used published "tune-books" in the worship services. They were divided into "treble", "counter", "tenor", and "bass" voices.

As late as 1809, Rev. William Bentley of the East Church in Salem, Massachusetts, noted in his journal that organs in the New England meeting houses were still a rarity, although some did exist. In an absence of an organ, a violin, viola, cello, German flute, and/or clarinet was used for accompaniment. For lack of ability to sight-read the musical notes from tune-books, "choristers" with some knowledge and ability of it were selected from the congregation to lead the congregation in song. They would "line-out" each phrase and verse. Our first choristers were Samuel Blackman, Nathan Booth, and Elnathon Patterson, "... to set ye Psalm in all public worship" according to our archived records. Each of these men was also among the "memorialist" who petitioned the Connecticut General Assembly for the establishment of a New Stratford Ecclesiastical Society parish (now Monroe).

Those with on or near pitch and/or had a greater ability to sight-read music would eventually be seated together to strengthen the accompaniment acapella for the rest of the congregation, especially in the absence of instrumental accompaniment. Over time, and as the vocal ability grew among others, the choir was thus formed with sufficient ability and voice to sing for the congregation as well as with the congregation. By the twentieth century and the advent of sound recording, the choirs of different denominations recorded selected hymns or secular music to advance the ministry of their churches as well as to raise funds for their ministries. So it was with our Monroe Congregational Church choir.

By the end of the 1960's, our choir had grown to twenty-three members. The Music Committee annual report for 1969 recorded that, "In December 1967 (and under the direction of C. Thomas McCreedy) the choir cut a record of Christmas music and anthems. The record was a booming success and a complete sell-out. 400 records were sold, and 100 more were ordered..... Amount realized was \$794.50. The proceeds were used to buy a baby grand piano for Dineson Parlor". With money left over and added to a generous gift of \$250 from the Sunday School and Curtiss "Bud" Morvec's salary as Choir Director, they were able to buy a second baby grand piano for the Fellowship Hall. The original recording was made by a choir of twenty-three voices (7 sopranos, 8 altos, 3 tenors, and 5 basses) at the Plaza


Music Studios, Rockefeller Center, New York City. For the Palm Sunday evening service, March 30, 1969, this choir presented an Easter Cantata, *Our Risen Lord and King*, by Cuthbert Harris and Herman Von Berge, which was not recorded.



The following year, on March 27, 1970, Good Friday, according to the 1970 Music Committee Annual Report, the choir "presented The Seven Last Words of Christ, by Theodore Dubois, under the able direction of Bud Morvec. Wallis Pallis, tenor, and Elvin Campbell, baritone, were guest soloists. [They] were also able to have the help of chorus singers from other churches. Judy Tenney was special organist for the occasion." Judy was special because she played on the 1950 Baldwin organ located in the closet size room off the chancel out of sight, and which was on its last legs. The organ was replaced in 1985 with a tracker organ during the church expansion and renovation. According to the record jacket, they cut a record during the services in the Meeting House. The number of records "selfproduced" and sold from this recording session was not recorded, but the records were available on Easter Sunday.

It seems like we have come full circle today with our liturgical music for worship services. The organ is back in place, we have a gifted professional musician and concert pianist serving as organist and choir director, a strong vocal sound (on pitch) from our choir, instrumentalists to solo and accompany the vocalists, and our own band. And no longer is our form of verse only through the signing of the Psalms. Oh, and yes, the sounds they produce IS worthy of cutting records.
