On Any Given Sunday

On any given Sunday you make the decision whether or not to leave the to-do list undone, get the family in the car and head off to church. Maybe you carry more prayer requests than you can keep straight in your head. Perhaps the dire predictions you see in the news fills your heart. Like the coffee mug from which you drink, sometimes you come feeling lukewarm and empty.

At some point, you see me stand before you to tell you something like, 'Do not be afraid.' Really? Don't be afraid? Here you are, doing everything you can just to keep your head above water, and all you can think is, "how can she dare to say something like that to me?"

Deep down, I think we'd all prefer God's blessings to come in a big-gulp, bottomless cup. But scripture suggests that God prefers to work out of our scarcity. When Elijah needs safety, God sends him to a brook with a flock of ravens. When the brook dries up, God sends him to a widow. When the widow is making her last supper, God won't let the jar of meal hit "E" or the jug of oil run out until there's rain again.

What holds all our sacred stories together is what's at the center of them all. The One who keeps on turning up at the margins of society. The One who makes a way out of no way. The One who would send a messenger to the likes of a starving widow or a pregnant teenager, with a word like 'do not be afraid.' This is the same God who would take the likes of us and make us into a people who would dare to be witnesses of God's love and grace.

I know the message can be hard to hear, especially when grief and current responsibilities weigh your shoulders down. But fear has a way of freezing us in place, and closing us off to each other. That is fear's job: to keep us apart so that we can't recognize others as precious children of God. When we are unable to open our hearts and radically love those with whom we share little in common, the darkness has already won.



So it bears repeating, "Do not be afraid."

You who came to church with your gas gauge on "E." Do not be afraid. Some of us have too.

You who came to Bible study after a week of hearing about a national election gone off the rails. Do not be afraid. We can disagree on politics yet still have enough grace and love for one another to find common ground.

You who stayed home from church because you are wondering how your family is going to hold together and you can't fake happy. Do not be afraid. God is with you where ever you are.

You who have a hard time praying because the news from the doctor still rings in your ear. Do not be afraid. Your community will uphold you as the body of Christ in the world today.

Let me tell you, the cup of God's mercies, the bread of God's goodness, they will not fail you. They won't. God promises you, they won't. So I tell you again, do not be afraid. Do not be afraid. In peace, Pastor Jenn

Go and Do the Same

The theme for this stewardship year is the climactic line from the parable of the Good Samaritan: "Go and Do the Same." (Luke 10:25-

37). The implication is that God calls us to "go and do the same" as the Samaritan with all our resources—material, human, and natural.

The Samaritan as Example of Behavior for Stewardship

When I first heard the theme, "God and Do the Same," it sounded like a simple command to follow the example of the behavior of the Samaritan. Jesus used the Samaritan as an illustration of what it means to be faithful to God's purposes. So, at this level, the message of the parable is "Go and do the same kind of things for your neighbor—and your church—that the Good Samaritan did for the person robbed along the road."

In the context of a stewardship campaign, the line includes the meaning, "Go and give the same way the Samaritan gave."

When the Samaritan saw the person who had fallen among thieves at the side of the road, the Samaritan stopped and helped. That earlier traveler was beaten up, bleeding, alone, and abandoned. Today, individuals, households, neighborhoods, and communities are beaten up, bloodied, fallen alongside the road of life, alone, and abandoned. An individual's or household's commitment of time, talent, and money can help the church help them. A pledge can be an act of neighbor-love.

The Samaritan did not have access to a cell phone and EMTs, so the Samaritan took care of the person at the side of the road. Look at what the Samaritan did. The Samaritan personally got involved. The Samaritan took responsibility. And going beyond the moment to a long-term view,

the Samaritan wrote a check to the innkeeper to house and feed the person who fell among thieves while the earlier traveler was regaining strength.

We can easily draw out implications for today. The congregation should go and do the same. The congregation should get personally involved. The congregation should take responsibility. Members of the congregation should write checks that care for our neighbors—for shelters for the homeless, food pantries, and yes, the church.

More than Example of Behavior

At one level, the parable *is* a good example for behavior. That is implied in the last line, "Go and do the same." But at another level, the parable is more than an illustration for behavior. The parable shows deep response to others and to God's presence and purposes at the center of the life of the individual and life in community. The parable invokes solidarity based on response to God's purpose for all in community to experience as much blessing as possible.

God seeks to restore community through a great reunion of the human family so that all might live in solidarity, mutual support, and equality. Those who commit themselves to living according to God's purposes in community, find that living according to those purposes becomes a blessing for the community as a whole and for the individuals who live according to them. Indeed, the more people live into community life, they more they experience God's purposes in their immediate worlds.

To go and do the same as the Samaritan is to feel the world from the standpoint of others, and to respond in accord with God's realm purposes of restoration and renewal.

How can you feel the world from the standpoint of others?

How can you participate with God in helping the world become more like the realm of God?

OCWM Moment for Mission, from Julie McClenathan

Last Monday night about 15 of us gathered with Rev. Kent Siladi, the Connecticut Conference Minister for the United Church of Christ. He mentioned that among the 253 member churches in CT, our church in particular is known for our vitality, our generosity, our work with youth and faith formation, and our leadership development. One of the ways we have been generous has been through our commitment to Our Church's Wider Mission (also known as OCWM).

Through our OCWM support, we encourage and uplift local churches where lives are being changed. One example of this is in providing an insurance board that helps local churches like ours in the event something happens to our property – like a few years ago when the beam in the ceiling of this building was found to be cracked and needed repair. Our UCC Insurance Board was there so that we could file a claim and get the work done quickly.

Through our OCWM support, we identify, recruit, educate and support clergy leaders who inspire others, one example of this is found in the expertise of our regional minister, Rev. Dr. Michael Ciba, who has advised us through seven clergy and staff searches within the last 10 years. Without his wisdom, support and coaching, things would have been very different for our church during those transition times.

Through our OCWM support, we change lives through our global partnerships, missionaries and advocacy work, one example of this is the Ecumenical Accompanier program in Israel/Palestine, where Pastor Jenn will serve as a short term missionary during her sabbatical this coming spring.



The safety and well-being of our congregation is one of our most important concerns. Therefore, in the event of extremely bad weather on any given Sunday or church event, the following procedure will be followed:


1. **Sunday Worship Services:** At 7 am, we will decide whether or not to cancel the church service AND all other planned Sunday morning events, including Sunday School, the nursery, and coffee hour.


This decision will be communicated on TV Channel 8, CTWeather.com and WMNR (88.1). In addition, if someone is able, a church-wide e-mail and Facebook post will be done.


- a. Decision is made by Pastor Jenn (203-895-5607) and Joanne Malia (Chair of Deacons)
- b. Chair of Deacons notifies CT Weather/IAN Snap and Channel 8 (instructions below) and Jessica Pfalzgraf (ushers)
- c. Pastor (or in her absence, chair of deacons) notifies Debi Mastroni-Kenyon (who notifies coordinator and teachers), Will Duchon (who notifies musicians), Ann Zeiner (coffee hour), Reader and Trustee of the Day (as found in bulletin)
- 2. **Sr. and Jr. PF** groups will be notified of any changes or cancellations by e-mail, a phone tree and/or Facebook notifications as appropriate.
 - a. Cheramie Lee makes and communicates Sr PF decision
 - b. Debi Mastroni-Kenyon makes and communicates Jr PF decision
- 3. **Evening Meetings:** It is the responsibility of the convener to notify the meeting participants of changes or cancellations.
- 4. **Midweek Morning Programs:** If the Monroe School district either delays or cancels school, morning Bible studies and other church-sponsored morning programs are cancelled.
- 5. **Church Office:** If the Monroe School System is closed, and staff members are able to travel, they may choose to do so if conditions are safe. Otherwise, they may choose to work remotely.
