

As we move farther away from spring and into summer, the church calendar moves through its seasons as well. Advent (waaaay back in November!)—Christmas—Epiphany—Lent—Easter—and now we have entered the season of Pentecost. This second half of the church year is called "ordinary time", not meant as an adjective but as in "ordinal", which means numbered.





Comforter who would come to them after Jesus had returned to heaven. And so, 10 days after the Ascension, God sends the Holy Spirit which the church celebrates on Pentecost Sunday (May 28th).

As we heard in worship, Pentecost is also often referred to as the Birthday of the Church. This is the day that hundreds of people saw the Holy Spirit like tongues of fire dancing on peoples' heads and people of different cultures and ethnicities could understand each other in their own languages. High drama to be sure!

The symbols for the Holy Spirit are wind, fire and the dove (the dove comes from when Jesus was baptized); and the color on our church's paraments is Red. Although many churches only use red in church on rare occasions—on Holy Spirit occasions, such as Pentecost, Confirmation, Ordinations and Installations, I like to let the color linger a little

longer, until we get through one of our most exciting MCC seasons: **Strawberry Festival** month!



It's one of the most exciting times of year for our community, when we welcome thousands of guests to visit and sample our shortcakes, jams, pies, smoothies, dipped berries and more! Your chairs (Clark Gingras, Susie Cuseo, Frank Wittenauer and Josh Post) are diligently preparing for a wonderful Father's Day weekend full of laughter, hard work and good times. Stay tuned for more information on all the ways you can connect with the community by serving on the red-shirt team.

Another thing I am looking forward to in the days ahead is a **Pulpit Swap**! If you aren't familiar with the term, a pulpit swap is when churches change pastoral worship leadership for a Sunday. It's designed to expose the church to something a little different. It's designed to stretch pastors and churches in ways to help them see God differently.

Elisha's Corner

Beardsley Hall - The Second Addition

Gary Thompson, Church Historian

At twenty-six by forty-four feet the "church parlor" that became Beardsley Hall provided an ample 1,100 square foot venue for the church and civic activity needs of the time. The addition of the Centre School House to the rear of the building fifty years later, adding a kitchen, gave the building an added 600 square feet, expanding it to 1,700 square feet. It provided room for growth, but for only twenty years. By the mid 1950's, the Hall was cramped with the growing Sunday school attendance and the growing attendance of church membership.

Late in July 1956 at the quarterly congregation meeting (according to Jean Loveland, in her article in the July 27, 1956 Bridgeport Post) the members approved to commence another "expansion of facilities at Beardsley Hall to provide additional Sunday school rooms". Thomas S. Peterson was named Chairman of the Building Committee, and a \$35,000 building campaign was started, which included \$10,000 for renovations to the parsonage. Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Hubert H. Schwerdtle, awarded a construction contract to T.R. Burghart, Inc. of Bridgeport and contracted with Val Carlson of Shelton to be the architect. The Building Committee had allocated \$19,880 to "provide four Sunday school rooms, with sliding doors so as to create two large meeting rooms when needed." The plans provided for a utility room which would house a new heating unit, two new exits, and additional storage space. The campaign fund drive was professionally managed by Campaign Craftsmen, a firm from Yonkers, New York that "specializing in church work of this type". This was a common practice at the time for church capital projects.

They named the campaign "Faith for the Future" and its kick-off dinner was held (where else) in Beardsley Hall on September 17, 1956. Rev. Wynn Blair Sutphin of Pompano Beach, FL, a very popular church leader, author, and sermonist, formally from Yonkers, was the keynote speaker. It was a cultural affair, too. Vocal and instrumental entertainment was provided by opera soprano soloist Ruth Lanche and symphonic violinist Peter Dimitriades. A campaign brochure published by Campaign Craftsmen was mailed to all members of the congregation by the Building Committee. It introduced the firm as "Consecrated churchmen (that) will visit you in person. Beginning TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 18, 1956, and (who will) conduct a census of our church. They are our professional representatives. You can be proud to welcome these experienced, cultured men into your homes, and they will make a truly pastoral visitation." It was common the 1950's and 1960's, for church member "canvassers" to solicit the congregation for annual pledges by personal visits. The brochure also included pictures with subtitles for classroom needs, such as "huddled into small hives of busy confusion, the children are restless and uncomfortable", and "Cramped in the work-a-day atmosphere of the kitchen, it's hard to sense the call to worship", "And the ladies will have their kitchen to themselves!" Each member was asked to buy shares at \$500 each for the project paid for over three years. Memorials were offered at \$2,500 each for a classroom.

A Building Committee Report recorded that the "...restoring of the parsonage and building a four room addition to Beardsley Hall began October 1, 1956 with funds of \$22,000 to work with" supported by pledges out of the \$35,000 campaign goal. The funding portion for Beardsley Hall was only \$12,127 at the time, which proved later to delay its completion. Four months later, on January 22, 1957, the Committee reported that \$10,075 of the initial \$22,000 would be needed to complete the addition as planned, excluding landscaping. The initial funding pledges of \$22,000 had been exceeded by only \$310.27. Yet, as it is said, "the devil is in the detail". Professional campaign managers are contracted to secure pledges, not collect them. They also work to achieve the agreed-to campaign goal, which they did, and their job was completed. The Trustees were responsible for collecting the pledged denotations and fill the gap between what was needed and what was pledged. The apparent paramount need to renovate the parsonage had taken precedence. Yet the Beardsley Hall addition once started and nearly complete had to be finished.

The pledging was offered during the third longest period of economic prosperity the United States had ever experienced, with family incomes yielding 30% more purchasing power than it had in 1950. But, that was quickly coming to an end. The construction costs for the Beardsley Hall expansion had reached \$22,512. So, with a revised estimate to complete of \$10,385 from T.R. Burghart, Inc., the Trustees in February 1957, approved taking out a \$12,000 loan, without sufficient pledged backing, for the project's completion. To lower the costs, members of the congregation assumed responsibility for providing the room separators (\$1,100), excavation and back-filling, interior asphalt floor tiles, and electrical work, which was finished in March. What they would not give up was the contract specification for a 325,000 BTU heating system, because "... Beardsley Hall (had) never been adequately heated and (they were) determined to put in adequate heat at this time." They did have problems with it in October of 1957, but it was quickly remedied. Yet the impact of the economic slowdown was taking its toll on family incomes and on expected pledge receipts. Some that had pledged had also moved away. By October 15, 1959, the pledged total had reached \$24,869, \$10,000 short of the goal for the parsonage and Beardsley Hall. Only \$13,254, or 54%, of that had been received to date. On February 21, 1960, a little over the three year term for pledged payment, it was reported that \$14,991, only 60%, of the pledged total had been received. But, the loan allowed the addition to be completed, adding 1,422 square feet to the building. On January 6, 1957, the keys to the front door had been presented, and the new venue started paying for itself. By 1967, including a day care center, it earned \$1,257.50, plus use at no cost by nonprofit town and church sponsored organizations. Except for the schools in town it was the largest venue in Monroe. Yet, it was only less than another ten years before we outgrew Beardsley Hall and began Rexford House.
