#### **November 1, 2023**



There is a balm in Gilead To make the wounded whole There is a balm in Gilead To heal the wounded soul...

In the 2007 apocalyptic film "I Am Legend" fictional character Lieutenant Colonel Robert Neville is a military virologist and the last surviving uninfected human in a city that is overrun by vampires. Neville believes that every other non-vampire human

being in the world has died. Even though he is surrounded by death, Neville persists in his search for a cure to reverse the plague. With an insane and desperate optimism, he speaks as if death and destruction can still be reversed, saying "I'm not leaving...I'm not going to let this happen...."

It might be true that Neville was partly driven by his own hubris and post-traumatic stress (having lost his wife, daughter and finally his beloved dog to the virus). But on the positive side, Neville was certainly not paralyzed by the destruction found all around him. He refused to spend much time wringing his hands in despair because the world had changed dramatically beyond his control.

Instead, he was both resolute and uncompromising, believing he was personally responsible for transformation in the place where his feet touched the ground. Inspired by the life and love of his family and by Bob Marley's musical vision of a dying world transformed to life, Neville continued to push himself to survive, devoting weeks and months to discovering a cure. And in his dying moments, he authorized others to carry forward the work of healing and transformation he would never see completed.

The other day I was thinking about the similarities between the group-thinking of some congregations in what feels like a little bit like a real-life zombie movie. We who love the church have deeply felt the impacts of a global pandemic along with a host of other worries, including but not limited to political unrest, economic upheaval, wars in multiple places around the world and so many others.

And there is some truth to what commentators have been reporting about the Western Christian Church in general. Many of our congregations are quite tired, with little activity beyond worship. For these faith communities, the reasons for sticking with it may be less about ministry and mission and more about how uncomfortable it can be for a person who loves their church to lose it: I've been a member here for 40, 50 or 60 years. I want my funeral to be in this church. If more of those young families would just come, they would love this place the way we love this place.

I don't think that early commentators tell the full story of this challenging but ultimately transformational season. It turns out, there is a remnant of the faithful who are not easily moved. Modest bands of believers in urban, suburban, and rural communities continue living out their faith. While sober about their future, they are still disciplined and intentional about their ministries.

To those of you who have not given up; to those of you who are committed to your church; to those of you who believe that God is not through with us yet, this message is for you: *There is a balm in Gilead; there is a physician there.* And indeed, your Dr. Neville-thinking is indicative of the commitment of your time, talent and treasure which has enabled us to endure this season. So, thank you.

It's been said that radical love demands radical commitment, and that every neighborhood church is at ground zero in the economy of God. We are called to reverse the trajectory of despair and refocus on the opportunities for peace, love and abundance in our neighborhoods, our country, our planet, and even our beloved Monroe Congregational Church.

And I'm curious... in what ways have you witnessed our church change lives? In what ways do you hope for us to continue to do so together in the future? Have a blessed November, everyone!


A community of faith like ours gives us hope, reminds us of our value, calls us to discover and claim our purpose and motivates us to be a




